South LA Universal Basic Mobility Pilot

UBM Components:

- Mobility Wallet
- Electric Mobility
- Charging for All
- Workforce Development
- Stakeholder engagement and outreach
- Quick Build Active Streets
- Rail to Rail First Mile Last Mile
- Zero Emissions Delivery Solutions

Funding Sources:

- \$13.8 M California Air Resources Board (STEP grant)
- \$10 M Match from LADOT and project partners
- \$6.2 M Transformative Climate Communities grant










UBM Pilot Project Area





Phase I: Launched May 2023

- 900 participants were mailed cards
- 100 participants invited to sign up at in person workshops


Phase II: Launch expected Summer 2024

- **1,000** additional participants
- Prepaid debit card





110 L2 EV Chargers:

Providing L2 Chargers at City facilities such as libraries, parks, and on street lights.

BSL: 30 L2 EV Chargers installed on street lights in STEP project area. 45 to be installed.

Library: 16 L2 EV Chargers are in progress to be installed at 4 libraries. Equipment has been delivered. Final design plans pending.

RAP: 10 L2 EV Chargers at 5 parks. Considering solar EVSE option.



Stakeholder Engagement

Resident Advisory Committee: Preparing to 2nd cohort of RAC members.


Steering Committee: Meeting monthly. Highlighting one STEP project per meeting.

CBO Ambassadors: 3 CBO Ambassadors are finalizing contracts with SLATE-Z to assist all partners with on-the-ground outreach

Youth Ambassadors: 2 concurrent cohorts set to begin Fall 2023 at Frida Kahlo High School and Early College Academy.

CicLAvia events: 2021, 2022, 2023 4 events in project area completed.





Five Quick Build Design Treatments:

Use striping, signage, bollards, and other temporary elements to improve street safety.

Survey: LADOT identified potential east corridors and surveyed communities ut 27, 2023.

Route Rides: 1st bike test run conducte 15. Two additional rides to be schedule

Community-informed program to deploy of technology and services for:


- Local Businesses to adopt ZE delivery solutions and integrate into their delivery business

East Oakland Project Overview

Goal: Increase transit, walking, biking, and shared mobility trips while reducing SOV trips near the new BRT corridor

Budget: \$243k grant

Timeline: Fall 2020 to Dec. 2021, evaluation in March

2022

Methods:

- Financial Incentives
- Personalized Marketing of Alternatives
- Evaluation for Long-Term Program



Project Area

Financial Incentives

500 restricted prepaid debit cards for program participants to purchase trips or passes on public transit, bikeshare, and e-scooters

- Automated restrictions to merchant IDs, category codes
- Up to \$300 per card 2 loads of \$150 each
- Cards expire in November 2022
 - 2nd Round of \$200, expires December 2023
 - Added Bike Shops and Bike Maintenance as qualifying purchase



Personalized Marketing


- Tabling at libraries and community events
- "Flyering" at transit stations
- CBO, City Administrator newsletters
- 12,000 flyers mailed
- 3,000 flyers distributed through CBOs
- 2 Community Bike Rides with Cycles of Change
- Project website



Evaluation for Long-Term Program


- Program evaluation in spring 2022 (in full on webpage)
- Pre- and mid-program survey data travel patterns/shift,
 select demographic data, qualification
- Aggregated, anonymous prepaid card data evaluation
- Complementary UC Davis research in collaboration with SPIN
- Exploring long-term funding options

Pre-Program Survey Summary




About ¾ of participants' households earn less than \$40k per year

Majority of participants identify as Hispanic/Latino or Black/African American




Mid-Program Survey Summary




23% have driven alone less since receiving the card


40% of participants have changed the way they travel

Participants rode transit more and drove less as their primary mode of transportation for commute and other trips




Prepaid Card Usage

UC Davis: "Going Places: Universal Basic Mobility Pilot Programs in California

- Alleviating Transportation Poverty:
 Participants in the East Oakland Pilot
 reported better transportation experiences
- Better Access to Basic Necessities
- Improvements to ability to take care of basic needs, to get or keep a job, social relationships, recreation or exercise, ability to save money
- Higher satisfaction with life



Key Takeaways for Practitioners

- Prioritize equitable selection alongside
 mode shift goals. Engage both existing
 transit/shared mobility riders and vehicle
 owners to prompt both mode shift to
 sustainable options while preserving and
 rewarding existing riders.
- Work through existing community channels.
 Consider partnering with libraries, community-based organizations, community events and meetings, key stakeholders, and other trusted voices in the project area.



Key Takeaways for Practitioners

- Include technology needs in participation requirements when possible. Be prepared to "maneuver" the surveys for individuals by asking the questions aloud and clicking for them.
- Fund distribution method matters. Staff
 encountered many challenges with mailing
 prepaid debit cards directly to program
 participants that ultimately required that cards
 be replaced, resulting in a lower participation
 rate than anticipated.



Project Wins

- ~1,000 survey responses received
- Contacted over 30 community organizations
- Successful outreach coordination with other public agencies and projects
- Groundbreaking DOT-wide prepaid card contract
- Established new customer services processes
- Wide press/practitioner interest in project
